

NZCOM CONSENSUS STATEMENT

Informed Consent and Decision Making

This Consensus Statement was ratified at National Committee Meeting 11 May 1996

The New Zealand College of Midwives believes midwifery care takes place in partnership with women. It is the midwife's professional responsibility to uphold each woman's right to informed decision making throughout the childbirth experience.

Guidelines

- Informed decision-making involves the exchange and understanding of relevant information. Informed decision-making emphasises the autonomy of the individual. It respects the rights of individuals to make decisions about actions, which affect. Making an informed decision is part of a process, which results in either informed consent or refusal.
- Information should be provided in a way that the woman and her family can understand. It must be accurate, objective, relevant and culturally appropriate.
- The information should include:
 - ◆ the proposed treatment/intervention
 - ◆ the benefits of the treatment/intervention
 - ◆ the risks of the treatment/intervention
 - ◆ the alternatives to the treatment proposed and their risks and benefits
 - ◆ what would happen if no treatment/ intervention were used
- Where there is more than one professional perspective on a given issue this should be acknowledged and information given on, and how to access, this perspective.
- Women should be given time to think about the information and discuss it with others.
- Documentation should include a brief outline of the information given and when this occurred. All decisions should be clearly documented. Written consent must be obtained where either party requests it.
- Informed consensus is dynamic. If new evidence comes to light, the woman and the family have the right to change their minds.
